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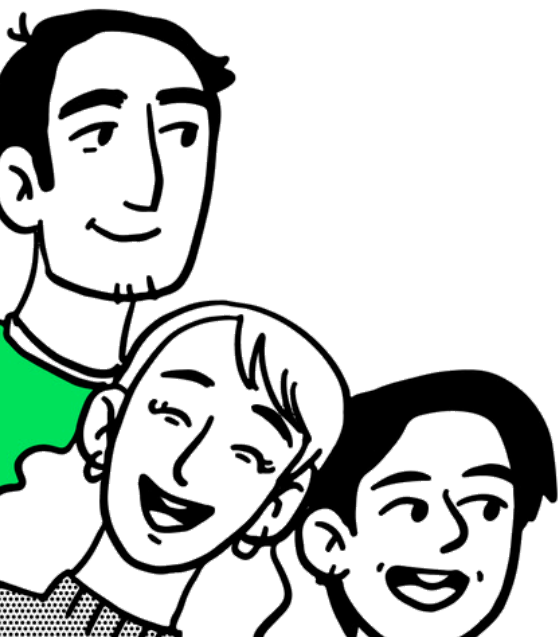

 - Leveraging video calls or team platforms, remote members introduce themselves, possibly including their location to add a personal touch.



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
